FEATURED ARTISTS



Allene Hackleman has been principal horn of the Edmonton Symphony Orchestra since 2004. A native of Vancouver, B.C., Allene studied horn with her father, Martin Hackleman, and continued her studies at the Interlochen Arts Academy in Michigan, and at the University of Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music as a student of Randy Gardner. Ms Hackleman has performed with the National, Montréal, and Winnipeg Symphony Orchestras, and the Colorado Music Festival. Allene has performed concerti with the Edmonton

Symphony Orchestra, Alberta Baroque Ensemble, Red Deer Symphony and the Victoria Symphony. Since 2007, Allene has been a member of the Summit Brass ensemble, and as such has recorded, taught and performed each summer as a faculty member at the Rafael Mendez Brass Institute in Denver, Colorado. Allene enjoys chamber music and has been a guest artist at the Festival of the Sound in Parry Sound, ON, the Ottawa Chamber Music Festival, the Edmonton Recital Society, and the Pender Harbour Chamber Music Festival, and was a featured artist at the International Women's Brass conference in 2010. Allene is a proud member of the Canadian National Brass Project and has performed with this group at the Festival de Lanaudière and Toronto Summer Music Festival. In 2015, Allene was invited to teach masterclasses at the Musikacademy in Belgrade, Serbia. She teaches at the University of Alberta.



Joshua Pantoja has been a member of the Puerto Rico Symphony Orchestra since 2004. He is currently the Horn Professor at the Puerto Rico Music Conservatory for both the College and Pre-College levels. He is the author of the books: *From Classical to Jazz - an Improvisation Method* and *Ornamenting your Improvisation- A Guide to Approach Notes*. He is an active chamber music performer with Camerata Caribe, Cafe Corta'o Horn Quartet and Pantojazz. Joshua is also a composer of popular songs.

He began his musical studies at Escuela Libre de Música in Caguas, Puerto Rico at the age of 12, where he received his first French Horn lessons from Professor Jorge Figueroa. He was accepted into the Puerto Rico Music Conservatory at the age of 15, and after a year at the Conservatory he was accepted to the Manhattan School of Music in New York. He later continued his musical development at the prestigious Juilliard School where he studied with Professor Jerome Ashby (former Co-Principal Horn of the New York Philharmonic). He returned to the Manhattan School of Music to complete a Master's degree studying with Professor Javier Gándara, 3rd horn of the Metropolitan Opera of New York. In addition to his primary teachers, Joshua has also studied with Erik Ralske, Julie Landsman, Michelle Baker and Jazz studies with Julito Alvarado.

Married to a beautiful Colombian woman, Mr Pantoja likes to spend his summers in Colombia, enjoys coffee, birds and going to the beach!



The Alloy Horn Quartet is a fusion of artistry and advocacy whose appealing performances are powering their rise to the top of the chamber music scene. Equally comfortable in classical and contemporary genres, the quartet is at ease sharing its passion for music with audiences of all kinds. In addition to exceptional performing, Alloy offers charismatic dialogue to disarm the rigidity of a traditional classical music experience.

Alloy was a Featured Artist at the 2018 International Horn Society's 50th Symposium, Mid-North Horn Workshop *(as the Uber Quartet)*, and have also appeared as soloists playing Schumann's virtuosic Konzertstück with orchestras such as the Kenosha Symphony (WI), Dubuque Symphony (IA), Tuscarawas Philharmonic (OH), and Fox Valley Orchestra (IL). Alloy has been a guest artist at several universities, presenting performances and masterclasses at UW-Milwaukee, Roosevelt University, Northern Illinois University, Northwestern University, UW-Stevens Point, UW-Oshkosh, Ball State University, University of St. Thomas, Youngstown State University, Central Arkansas University, and Millikin University. Alloy is committed to facilitating dialogues about modern careers in music with workshops focused on expanding and creating meaningful work in the arts.

Liz Deitemyer is a Chicago-are hornist with a dynamic freelance career that takes her from the concert hall to the basement jazz club. She enjoys a wide variety of musical outlets, including recording with rock bands, developing interactive chamber music concerts, accompanying musicals, and playing classical literature in orchestral settings. Liz can also be seen on the narrow end of an alphorn at festivals and private events. Her most recent endeavors integrate horn playing with her education in clinical social work to use the power of music to affect personal, psychological, and social change.

Liz studied at Indiana University with Jeff Nelsen and Michael Hoeltzel. Shas held positions with the Arkansas Symphony Orchestra, Dubuque Symphony Orchestra, Stonegate Brass Quintet, and Second City Brass Quintet. She has performed with the Chicago Symphony Orchestra and appears regularly with regional orchestras throughout the Midwest including the South Bend Symphony, the Illinois Philharmonic, the Southwest Michigan Symphony, and the New Philharmonic. As an educator, Deitemyer is a frequent guest lecturer at high schools and colleges presenting on the topic of how to build a career in the arts. She has been a guest presenter at the Illinois MENSA chapter's annual convention, presenting "From Seashells to Shiny Bells," a story of how horns have evolved over the centuries. In 2020, she received a Master's Degree in Social Work from University of Chicago's Jane Addams School of Social Work and currently has a part-time psychotherapy practice.

Anna Jacobson is a Chicago-area musician with a diverse skill set. As a freelance horn player, she has performed with many local and regional ensembles, including the South Bend Symphony, Camerata Chicago, Illinois Symphony, Dubuque Symphony, Civic Orchestra of Chicago, and Chicago Symphony Orchestra. She was a member of the Lucerne Festival Academy for several summers, playing under the baton of Pierre Boulez. An active chamber musician, Anna is a founding member of the award-winning

V3NTO Brass Trio, and a member of the Alloy Horn Quartet. She is also a folk musician and fiddler, winning the Midwest Fiddle and Banjo Championship in 2017. She plays and sings regularly with Chicago-based singer/songwriter Jonas Friddle, winner of the 2012 John Lennon Songwriting Contest. Anna is also a member of theatrical rock 'n' roll marching band Mucca Pazza.

A dedicated educator, Anna is on faculty at the Old Town School of Folk Music, teaches horn students at an area high school, and is a registered Suzuki violin teacher. She holds a Bachelor of Music degree from Lawrence University, where she studied with James DeCorsey, and a Master of Music degree from DePaul University, where she studied with Jon Boen and Oto Carrillo.

Kelly Langenberg (M.M., DePaul University, B.M., B.M.E., Baldwin-Wallace University) is a classical musician and horn teacher recently transplanted from Chicago to the Florida Panhandle. Langenberg currently serves as Applied Faculty at Gulf Coast State College and is the Executive Director of the Bay Education Foundation in Panama City, FL. Kelly's "ferociously powerful" (International Trumpet Guild Journal, 2014) playing has been heard in orchestral and chamber music settings throughout the Midwest, including the Alliance Brass Quintet, the Alloy Horn Quartet, Chicago Philharmonic, Wisconsin Philharmonic, the Dubuque, Kenosha, Northwest FL, Pensacola, Peoria, Lake Forest, Battle Creek, Elgin, Kalamazoo, Ars Viva!, Quad City symphonies, Yucatan Symphony (Mexico), the Cleveland Orchestra through their Kent/Blossom program, and with Josh Groban, Peter Gabriel, Il Volo, and others.

Kelly is currently pursuing a Doctorate at the University of IL Urbana-Champaign with Bernhard Scully and completed a Certificate in Nonprofit Management from the University of IL at Chicago in 2018. Kelly's other primary teachers include Neil Kimel, Jon Boen, and Hans Clebsch. Langenberg is a Hans Hoyer USA Concert Artist and a Denis Wick Artist and Clinician.

Dr. Natalie Douglass Grana is a hornist and educator based in Chicago, Illinois. Her integrative approach to teaching horn through singing and inner hearing has garnered international recognition, and she has worked with hundreds of students to develop fluency as performers and complete musicians. Dr. Grana is on faculty at Lake Forest College and DePaul University in Chicago and previously served as Assistant Professor of Horn and head of brass at Utah Valley University. Her pedagogy is inspired by Zoltan Kodály, and she spent the 2015-2016 academic year on a U.S. Fulbright Grant to the Kodály Institute of the Liszt Academy of Music in Hungary. She has spoken at International Horn Society symposia, has been a keynote speaker for NAfME, and has served as a visiting academic at Oxford University. She has been a guest artist at some of the world's finest musical institutions, including the Royal Conservatoire of the Hague (Netherlands) and the Royal Academy of Music (London, UK). She has taught at the renowned Kendall Betts Horn Camp since 2013. Her book, "A Singing Approach to Horn Playing," is available by Oxford University Press. She is an active orchestral and chamber performer, including tours under the batons of Lorin Maazel and Krzysztof Penderecki and performances with musicians like Josh Groban, Idina Menzel, and Mannheim Steamroller. Dr. Grana holds a D.M.A. in Horn Performance from the University of Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music and an MM in Horn Performance and BME in Instrumental Music Education from the University of Illinois in Urbana-Champaign.



Robert Rearden joined the National Symphony Orchestra in 2016. He served as principal horn of the Florida Orchestra from 2010 to 2016 and was a member of the New World Symphony from 2006 to 2010. He has performed regularly as a guest musician with the Cleveland Orchestra since 2004, including multiple recordings and tours of Europe, Asia, and the U.S., and was a long-term substitute with the orchestra in the 2014-2015 season. Rearden has performed as guest principal horn with the New York Philharmonic, Chamber Orchestra of Europe, Saint Paul Chamber Orchestra and Orpheus Chamber Orchestra. Rearden has also performed with the Philadelphia Orchestra, San Francisco Opera Orchestra,

All-Star Orchestra, Kennedy Center Opera House Orchestra, and with the Mainly Mozart, Britt, Artosphere, Steamboat Springs, Spoleto USA, and Eastern music festival orchestras. He completed his undergraduate degree at the University of South Carolina as a student of Robert Pruzin and earned a Master of Music degree and artist diploma at the Cleveland Institute of Music as a student of Eli Epstein and Richard Solis. He also studied with Julie Landsman and with David Wakefield. He was a fellowship recipient at Tanglewood and the Aspen Music Festival. While with the Florida Orchestra, Rearden performed the Nocturno by Franz Strauss in a transcription for horn and orchestra by Teddy Abrams with Abrams conducting, and the Horn Concerto No. 2 by Richard Strauss with conductor Stuart Malina. He was a featured artist at the Southeast Horn Workshop in 2017. Rearden teaches horn at the Peabody Institute in Baltimore, Maryland.



Born in Montréal, Canada, **Sophia Kim Cook** pursued piano studies first at the Conservatoire de musique du Québec à Montréal, finishing at McGill University's Schulich School of Music, receiving both her Bachelors with Honors and Masters of Music there.

Described as a 'a steadying presence at the piano' (Washington Post) and a 'virtuosic piano backbone' (DC Arts Beats), Ms. Kim Cook is a sought out collaborative pianist and orchestral pianist, having played for a myriad of soloists and ensembles, including

the National Symphony Orchestra, the Kennedy Center Opera House Orchestra, The National Philharmonic, the American Pops Orchestra, and the Maryland and Alexandria Symphony Orchestras. She is also principal pianist for the Washington Master Chorale as well as collaborative pianist for many conferences and workshops including the National Symphony Orchestra Summer Music Institute, the International Trumpet Guild Conference, and the American Trombone Workshop. 

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
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
